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Daylight Director's Message: It's better to be lucky than good!

Some modelers say that model railroading is dying as a hobby. I refuse to believe that statement, but I do know that the number of NMRA members is declining. Not all model railroaders want to be a part of the NMRA,

but they reap the benefits of the organization. In theory, if we can increase the total number of active model railroaders, a percentage of them will be interested in joining the NMRA, provided the organization is relevant to their interests.

I've been very fortunate (lucky) to be asked to be a part of Fresno State Transportation Institute's (FSTI) railroad model competition that kicks off this fall. Thirty teams of up to ten students each, ranging from K-12 in age, will be competing to see who can design, build, and operate a railway system profitably. Competing teams will need to research how real railroads operate, acquire the right-of-way, and construct an N scale layout on a map of California and Nevada. There are three levels of competition based upon the grade level of

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the students: elementary, middle school and high school. Each category will offer some unique challenges to the teams appropriate to the ages of the competitors.

So why is Fresno State holding a competition about railroads? FSTI's mission is to help educate the public about all forms of transportation. Getting children involved at an early age and helping them understand the various modern transportation systems will help them make informed decisions as they mature. Railroads offer one of the most sustainable and efficient modes of transportation.

To publicize the event and get feedback from the model railroading community, the concept of the competition was introduced on John Abatecola's TSG Live Talking Trains. The link to the show is:

The feedback from the audience was enthusiastic and very positive. This gave the group more confidence to present the idea to different sponsors. Walthers has signed on as a major sponsor of the event. They will provide the N scale model railroad equipment including Kato locomotives, Walthers passenger cars, Bachmann DCC controllers and Atlas track. Thanks to Walthers for stepping up with such a generous donation that will allow all the teams to compete with first rate equipment to build their railroads.

Because of this competition children will be exposed to model railroading along with parents and teachers. Previous meetings with interested schools have been positive as well, with students eager to form teams and begin planning for the competition. Parents have been looking for family activities that can be shared by parents and children alike.

As the teams begin to organize, they will need the help and guidance of experienced model railroaders like <u>you</u> to lend a helping hand, guide them, and make the experience of building and operating a model railroad fun and enjoyable. Even though the competition is for the Fresno County schools; coaching and mentoring can be done remotely using Zoom. This is an excellent opportunity to share our passion for model railroading with others and even recruit new members to the Daylight Division. The formation of teams will take place this fall, I'm hoping that you'll volunteer to help with this worthwhile project. I'll be reaching out to you for your help as fall approaches.

What Is the Achievement Program?

So, what exactly is the Achievement Program? From the introduction on the NMRA website, we can read "In simple terms, the Achievement Program (AP) is a travel guide to help you on your journey through the world of model railroading. The AP also provides incentive to learn and master the many crafts and skills necessary in the hobby of model railroading. With the completion of each category, you will be issued a certificate acknowledging your achievement."

"The AP requirements are a set of standards, but they can also serve as a set of guideposts for those who are new, near-new, and not-so-new to the hobby. Not because they lead to some sort of official pat-on-the-back, but because they are a source of ideas for projects that can help us learn to become better modelers."

"Briefly, the AP is a system of requirements for demonstrating a superior level of skill in various aspects of our hobby. It covers not only building various types of <u>models</u>, but also building other things, which are important to the hobby, such as <u>scenery</u>, <u>structures</u>, <u>track work</u>, and <u>wiring</u>. It also recognizes service to the <u>hobby</u> and the <u>NMRA</u>, which are important as well. The Achievement Program is also a personal commitment to share one's knowledge with others and to encourage them as they also make the AP journey."

There are eleven different AP categories in which a certificate can be awarded. The requirements for each category are beyond the scope of this article but are described in detail on the NMRA website (nmra.org/categories). The eleven categories are grouped into four areas, as shown below:

Model Railroad Equipment

Master Builder – Motive Power Master Builder – Cars

Settings

Master Builder – Structures

Master Builder – Scenery

Master Builder – Prototype Models

Engineering and Operation

Model Railroad Engineer – Civil

Model Railroad Engineer – Electrical

Chief Dispatcher

Service to the Hobby

Association Official

Association Volunteer

Model Railroad Author

Although there are eleven different AP categories, a member only needs to meet the requirements for seven categories, with at least one from each of the four areas, to qualify for the eventual, and ultimate goal of Master Model Railroader (MMR).

This may seem daunting to you, but please don't get discouraged. There is also a "starter" award for those modelers that are new to the AP, the Golden Spike Award. We'll go over the Golden Spike Award in the next installment of the series.

In-Person or Hybrid?

In the few hours each week when I'm not model railroading, I chair my church's finance committee and lead a Bible study class. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, both of these groups moved to the Zoom platform. Now two years later, either of these could go back to meeting in person, but neither has. The Bible study class continues to meet exclusively via Zoom, while the finance

committee now meets in a hybrid fashion, with most members getting together in the church library and the remainder joining with Zoom.

Why, you may ask, do we not just go back to meeting in person, now that everyone is vaccinated and boosted? Surely, anyone not fully protected could wear a mask? Of course, that's possible, but there are benefits to Zoom: it's easier to do from home and it provides an opportunity for others to join, who could not attend an all in-person meeting. During the Bible study, I like to share my screen with a video lecture which would be harder to do in person. But, more importantly, during the pandemic we acquired two new attendees from Ecuador, and I don't want to take away their opportunity to participate. Typically, in addition to those two, two or three others attend from their distant homes and another may attend from a vehicle. The finance committee works basically the same way, minus the two people from Ecuador.

The 2021 PCR convention was moved to Zoom exclusively, and it turned out that we had more attendees than normal, and from greater distances, including Canada, the UK, and Australia. The NMRA national convention that year experienced a similar attendance from great distances, accompanied by a much-reduced cost for those far-away participants. The 2022 PCR convention went back to Rohnert Park and—as far as I could tell—had no virtual component. So, is that a good return more or less to normal, or should we try to include Zoom?
